Idiopathic toe walking is a diagnosis of exclusion, meaning that no other problems can be identified from your child's medical history and physical exam. For this reason, specific tests[such as x-rays, CT and MRI scans, and nerve and muscle tests involving electrode patches or needles]are not usually ordered.

Diagnosis. Toe walking can be observed during a physical exam. In some cases, the doctor may do a gait analysis or an exam known as electromyography (EMG). During an EMG, a thin needle with an electrode is inserted into a muscle in the leg. The electrode measures the electrical activity in the affected nerve or muscle.

Toe Walking Diagnosis A physical exam is usually all that is needed to diagnose toe walking, but during the exam, the provider will also assess the child's gait, range of motion and muscle tone.
